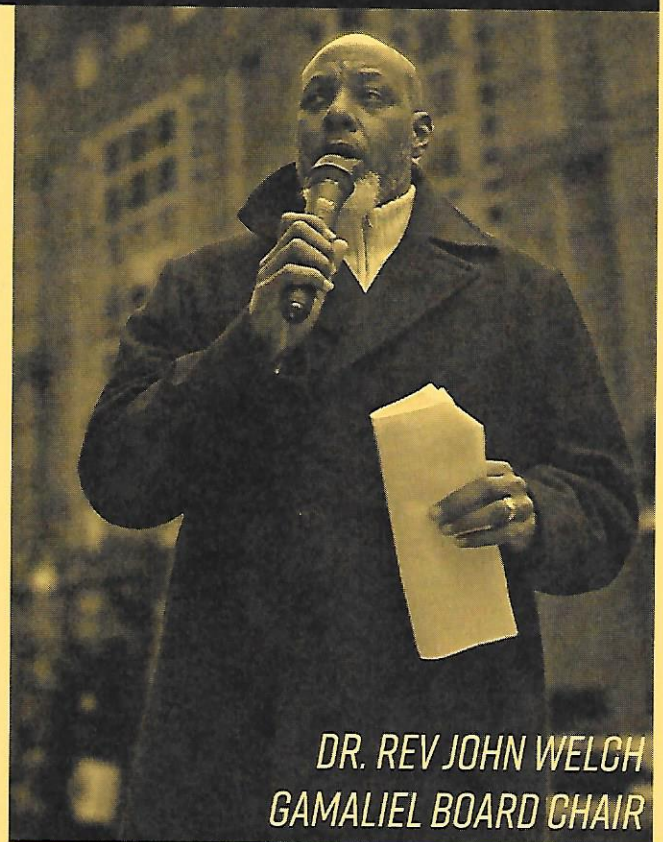

Crisis Intervention Services

Crisis Intervention Services offer a variety of services such as telephone, walk-in, and mobile crisis assessments. A skilled mental health clinician is available to care for people who need immediate intervention or help, twenty-four hours a day, seven days a week.

Walk-in crisis assessments are available daily from 7am to 10pm. This face-to-face meeting allows the clinician to assess the individual's presenting problem, provide short-term crisis intervention therapy, and then refer the individual to the next most appropriate level of treatment.

Mobile Crisis Services are available Monday thru Friday from 10am to 6pm. Mobile Crisis Services will travel to where the individual is located and provide onsite assessment, short-term crisis intervention therapy, and then help arrange for the individual to enter the most appropriate level of treatment.

The telephone crisis hotline is available twenty-four hours a day by calling 724-371-8060 or 1-800-400-6180. Please feel free to contact Crisis Services at any time to make a referral.

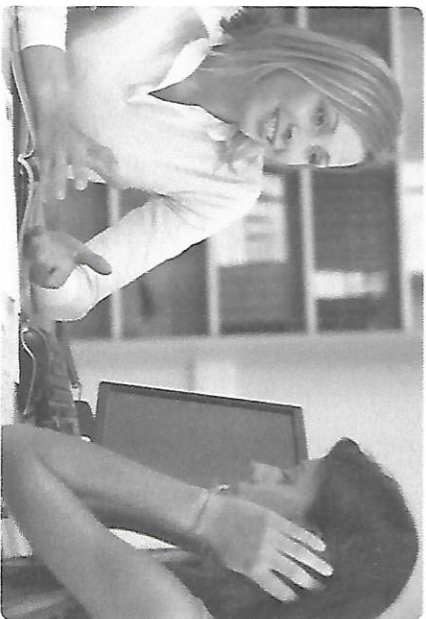

THINGS TO DO AFTER A CRITICAL INCIDENT

• WITHIN THE FIRST 24 – 48 HOURS periods of appropriate physical exercises alternated with relaxation will alleviate some of the physical reactions.



- Structure your time – keep busy.
- You're normal and having normal reactions – don't label yourself crazy.
- **Recognize.** Talk to people – talk is the most healing medicine.
- Be aware of numbing the pain with overuse of drugs or alcohol. You don't need to complicate this with a substance abuse problem. Reach out – people do care.
- Maintain as normal a schedule as possible. Spend time with others and talk about what happened to you.
- Help others who were affected as much as possible by sharing feelings and checking out how they are doing.
- Give yourself permission to feel rotten and share your feelings with others.
- Don't make any big life changes. Do make as many daily decisions as possible which will give you a feeling of control over your life, i.e., if someone asks you what you want to eat – answer them even if you're not sure.
- Get plenty of rest.
- **Understand.** Reoccurring thoughts, dreams or flashbacks are normal – don't try to fight them – they'll decrease over time and become less painful.
- Eat well-balanced and regular meals (even if you don't feel like it).

Southwood Family Based Mental Health Services

Southwood's Family Based Mental Health Services (FBMS) are an intense, in-home service for children or adolescents with emotional or behavioral issues. FBMS are typically used when other services have not been successful. FBMS are designed to prevent out-of-home placements such as Inpatient Hospitalization, Residential treatment Facility, CRR, Juvenile Detention facilities, Foster care or shelter settings. FBMS may also be used to help transition children back into their home after these types of placements.

Southwood Family Based Mental Health Services provides intense therapeutic interventions and support services to the identified child and family to empower the family to build skills to care for their child with behavioral issues. Unlike other services for children, FBMS uses a model of treatment known as structural family therapy, which may involve the entire family system in treatment, including the parents, grandparents (or other caregivers), siblings, and of course the identified child. Interventions focus on family interactions and relationships, and are strength based, assuming that all parents and children have good intentions and missions, but may need guidance and coaching in how to address difficulty behaviors or interpersonal issues.



Features of Southwood's Program

- Comprehensive assessment of family needs
- Team delivered services provided by a team composed of a Master's Level Clinician and Mental Health worker
- Services available 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, including crisis hotline

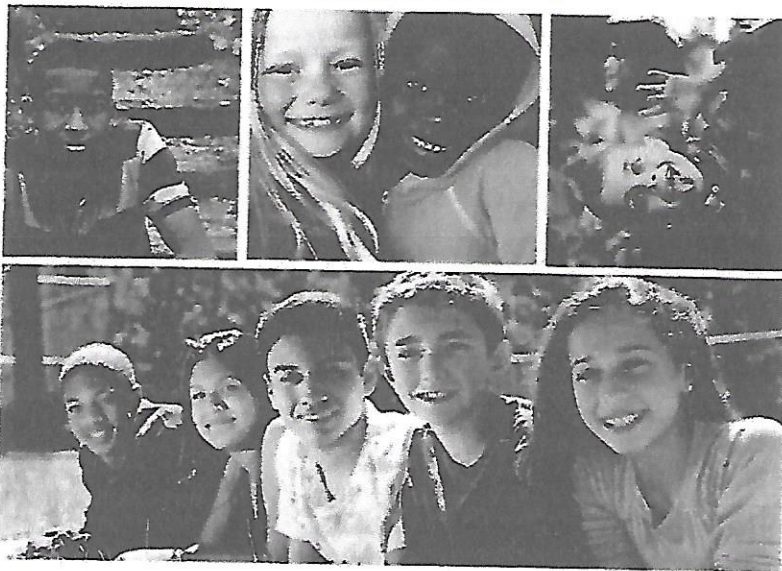

Who Do We Serve?

- Youth ages birth-21 in Washington, Beaver, Fayette and Greene Counties
- Have at least 1 parent or caregiver willing to participate in treatment/services
- Must have a mental health diagnosis and an evaluation from a psychologist or psychiatrist recommending FBMHS

Also provides Acute Psychiatric Care for children aged 4-18 with severe mental health and behavioral issues. Psychiatric Residential Treatment is available through Southwood's two specialized programs for Intellectual Disabled/Autistic children and males with Sexually Maladaptive Behaviors.

All of Southwood's behavioral health services have received the Gold Seal of Approval from The Joint Commission



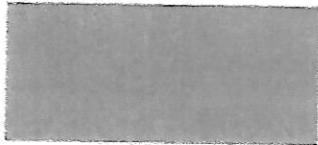

Description of Beaver County McKinney Vento Supportive Housing Programs

Community Assisted Residential Living (C.A.R.L.) is a tenant based rental model administered by the Housing Authority of beaver County in which rental assistance vouchers in the form of Tenant Based Rental Assistance (TBRA) will be issued to the chronically homeless or homeless households with an illness or a disability. The Program focuses on households with the longest length of homelessness, homeless households with children, veterans, and victims of domestic violence. It is a Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) program within Beaver County's Continuum of Care. Individuals and families live in scattered sites. The program is not funded to provide case management services.

Crescent Commons is a permanent supportive housing program administered by the Housing Authority of Beaver County which provides housing vouchers to participants who are chronically homeless with disabilities and who have exhausted all other housing options. At full operational capacity the program should house approximately 31 people. Individuals and families live in scattered sites. The program is not funded to provide case management services. Friendship Homes is a 33 bed permanent supportive housing program administered by the Salvation Army for both chronically homeless and non-chronically homeless individuals and families and with disabilities. There is a 5 bed single site for homeless men in New Brighton. The other program participants are housed in apartments at College Hill Apartments in Beaver Falls. Julie's Place provides permanent supportive housing to 12 chronically homeless individuals and families with mental illness, physical and health issues, and substance abuse issues. The program is administered by Changing the World, Inc. Individuals and families live in scattered sites. The program is not funded to provide case management services. Melrose Place LIFE Beaver County's permanent supportive housing program which will serve approximately 16 disabled homeless senior persons, prioritizing chronically homeless adults and veterans from the surrounding Beaver County community. The program participants will be housed in scattered sites located in the Beaver County community, with a provision for rental assistance and moderate case management services. The program is currently under development.

Safety Net is a TBRA program administered by the Housing Authority of Beaver County which provides rental assistance to adult individuals with chronic mental illness who are difficult to place in current permanent housing. This project is considered housing of last resort, since the target population is Chronically Homeless (CH) adults who come from the streets and traditionally fall through the cracks. Individuals live in scattered sites. The program is not funded to provide case management services. Contact information: Lisa Kelleher hacblk@comcast.net

Stone Harbour is a transitional supportive housing program administered by Cornerstone Recovery and Supports (CRS) which provides supportive housing for 12 chronically homeless individuals struggling with co-occurring disorders of mental illness and substance abuse, as well as those with legal histories. Individuals live in a single site in Freedom PA. The program is funded to provide on-site case management services.
