Description of Beaver County McKinney Vento Supportive Housing Programs

Community Assisted Residential Living (C.A.R.L.) is a tenant based rental model administered by the Housing Authority of Beaver County in which rental assistance vouchers in the form of Tenant Based Rental Assistance (TBRA) will be issued to the chronically homeless or homeless households with an illness or a disability. The Program focuses on households with the longest length of homelessness, homeless households with children, veterans, and victims of domestic violence. It is a Permanent Supportive Housing (PSH) program within Beaver County's Continuum of Care. Individuals and families live in scattered sites. The program is not funded to provide case management services.

Crescent Commons is a permanent supportive housing program administered by the Housing Authority of Beaver County which provides housing vouchers to participants who are chronically homeless with disabilities and who have exhausted all other housing options. At full operational capacity the program should house approximately 31 people. Individuals and families live in scattered sites. The program is not funded to provide case management services. Friendship Homes is a 33 bed permanent supportive housing program administered by the Salvation Army for both chronically homeless and non-chronically homeless individuals and families and with disabilities. There is a 5 bed single site for homeless men in New Brighton. The other program participants are housed in apartments at College Hill Apartments in Beaver Falls. Melrose Place LIFE Beaver County's permanent supportive housing program which will serve approximately 16 disabled homeless senior persons, prioritizing chronically homeless adults and veterans from the surrounding Beaver County community. The program participants will be housed in scattered sites located in the Beaver County community, with a provision for rental assistance and moderate case management services. The program is currently under development.

Safety Net is a TBRA program administered by the Housing Authority of Beaver County which provides rental assistance to adult individuals with chronic mental illness who are difficult to place in current permanent housing. This project is considered housing of last resort, since the target population is Chronically Homeless (CH) adults who come from the streets and traditionally fall through the cracks. Stone Harbour is a transitional supportive housing program administered by Cornerstone Recovery and Supports (CRS) which provides supportive housing for 12 chronically homeless individuals struggling with co-occurring disorders of mental illness and substance abuse, as well as those with legal histories. Individuals live in a single site in Freedom PA. The program is funded to provide on-site case management services. Contact information: Sally Ricci sricci@crscares.org

Our History...

The Society of Saint Vincent de Paul was founded in Paris, France in 1833 by Frederic Ozanam, a 20-year old student at Sorbonne University.

Challenged to "practice what they preached", Frederic and a group of fellow students sought out the poor in Paris in their homes and brought them bread, clothes and most importantly, friendship. This small group took as their Patron the great French priest, Saint Vincent de Paul.



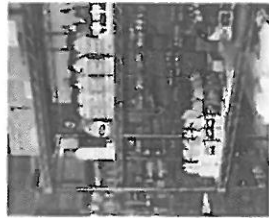
Similar groups began to form in Paris, and then spread throughout France, and eventually throughout the world. In 1845, the first U.S. Conference was formed in St. Louis, Missouri. Seven years later (1852) the first Conference was started in the heart of Pittsburgh. Today there are over 100 Conferences within the Diocese of Pittsburgh with more than 1,000 members.

Our Members...

Vincents are men and women of charity, compassion and action who personally reach out to their brothers and sisters in need. Vincents share their time, talents and resources in the spirit of Saint Vincent de Paul who reminds us that *the poor are our masters, we are their servants.*

Nourished by prayer & reflection, mutually supportive gatherings and adherence to a basic Rule, Vincents know that service to a brother or sister in need is in fact an encounter with our Lord Jesus Christ.

Jesus tells us that whatever we do for the least of our brothers and sisters is done for Him. (Matthew 25:40).



"I was hungry and you gave me food..."

The Society operates two major food pantries, serving people on Pittsburgh's Northside and in Butler. Many of our parish conferences also maintain food pantries, distributing food and toiletries to 1,000's of people annually.

"I was naked and you clothed me..."

Partnering with more than 70 non-profit organizations, including county



social services, employment services and churches, the Society fills over 3,000 clothing vouchers annually at six conveniently located thrift stores. Upon receiving a clothing voucher, clients are able to shop for their individual style and size of clothing free-of-charge at any of our six Thrift Stores.

"I was ill and you cared for me..."

Unfortunately, some individuals die alone and seemingly forgotten with no one to provide for their burial. They may be homeless, destitute, or living alone in a nursing home. In partnership with local funeral directors, the Society of St. Vincent de Paul arranges a dignified burial for these often overlooked individuals.



"I was a stranger and you welcomed me..."

The Society provides assistance to individuals and families who are struggling to make their monthly utility payments (gas, water, electric). We work closely with all of the major utility companies and help people in need connect with



LIHEAP, CRISIS and the Dollar Energy Fund to ensure services are maintained and uninterrupted.

"I was in prison and you visited me..."

Michael's Place is a voluntary, residential program for ex-offenders who are transitioning from jail or prison to independent living. The program provides compassionate help encompassing residents' spiritual, physical, psychological and social well-being. Michael's Place accepts men, who are homeless, willing to live by house rules, participate fully in a recovery program such as AA and/or NA and attend out patient therapy when needed. Expected stay is approximately six months.

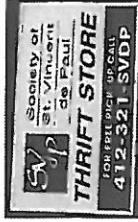
