

July 9, 2020 Meeting Agenda

Welcome and Housekeeping: Dina called the meeting to order at 12:35 but was having technical difficulties so the meeting start was delayed by a few moments. She reminded the group to sign into the chat box, reviewed some Zoom basics, and alerted everyone to the meeting being recorded only for the purpose of assisting with the preparation of the meeting minutes.

The Housing & Homeless Coalition welcomes ideas, opinions, and knowledge from a broad spectrum of partners. Therefore meetings are open to the public and new members are always welcomed. Meetings take place the 2nd Thursday of every month at 1:30 pm in the CYS Conference Room on Zoom until further notice. Zoom meetings are recorded to assist with the preparation of the meeting minutes. The recording will not be shared or posted.

1. OPEN DISCUSSION

Terry Lukes (The Association for the Blind) noted that even though their building is still closed to the public they can assist with transportation to doctor's appointments and can provide assistance with obtaining glasses. For more information call, 724. 506.6477.

Natalie Meade (Head Start/Early Head Start) announced that even though their buildings are closed they are still providing online instruction. She stated that they are taking applications and processing them over the phone with the families. She reminded the group that there is no cost for their services. Rebecca Salopak (Housing Authority of Beaver County) asked if people are still experiencing long wait times to receive their unemployment. She stated that she is working with a couple who was approved in March and has yet to receive a check. Dianne Funkhouser stated that CareerLink has an Unemployment Compensation rep at their office and she has been successful in helping folks receive their benefits in a timely manner. She did note that the since the word is getting out that the UC rep is starting to get behind with it taking a few days now to receive benefits. CareerLink can be reached at 724.728.4860. Dianne also reminded the group that the additional funding for people who lost their jobs due to coronavirus is ending at the end of July. Cynthia Gilkey noted that Neighborhood Legal Services can assist with UC claims as well. Neighborhood Legal Services can be reached at 724.378.0595. Dina Ciabattoni (CoC Coordinator) announced that Veterans Leadership Program is holding a food distribution event on 7/13/2020 at 12 pm at 2934 Smallman Street Pittsburgh PA 15201.



Dina also noted that the PA and federal eviction moratoriums have been extended through 8/31/2020. The PA eviction moratorium is for those people who are not receiving assistance through PHFA's Rental Relief Program and/or are not covered by one of the several other federal moratoriums or judicial orders. She noted that the federal moratorium applies to those properties and mortgages backed by PHA.

Paul Lebanik (St. Vincent de Paul) asked if we had any additional information regarding the utilities moratorium. The group responded that no deadline has been established yet. Dina stated that she will get an updated flyer and distribute it. Branden Dudek (Central Outreach & Wellness) reminded the group that they provide free sexually transmitted infections testing and treatment. To schedule an appointment call: 724.707.1155.

Makesha West (RHD) reported that they have detox and rehab beds available. She also noted that their expansion should be completed soon. If in need call: 724.508.3993.

Nancy Grieco (Red Cross) reported that they have assisted several households affected by house fires over the last few months. She noted that this is an unusual increase and that most of the fires originated in electrical outlets. She gave thanks to assistance that The Cornerstone gave on many of the cases.

2. AGENDA

Cooling Centers

Dina Ciabattoni

Dina reported that the recent hot temperatures have triggered the Cooling Centers to open. However a few of the centers cannot open due to social distancing guidelines. Currently The Cornerstone and the New Brighton borough building are the only locations open. She asked if anyone had any suggestions for additional locations particularly in the southern part of the county since we don't have any locations operating there. No suggestions were made. Dina asked the group to continue to think about options. She noted that the CoC can provide masks, hand sanitizer, and water to assist any agency that is willing to serve as a Cooling Center. She noted that it would be helpful during this heat wave if an agency is willing even on a temporary basis to serve in this capacity.

PHFA CARES Rent Relief and Mortgage Assistance Programs Dina Ciabattoni

Dina explained that all information for these programs can be found on the PHFA website noted above. She noted that the Mortgage Assistance applications are submitted to and processed by PHFA. The Rental Relief Program applications go to Community Development Program (1013 8th Avenue Beaver Falls, PA 15010). She explained that both the landlord



and the tenant have to agree to the terms of the program and complete separate applications. Dina noted that the county has not received the actual contract yet so all of the details have not been worked out at this time. She stated that we expect to receive it in the coming days and will then have more information about payments, turn around time etc. She will update the Coalition once these details are worked out.

ESG, HAP, ESG-CV updates

Dina Ciabattoni

Dina stated that the regular ESG and HAP applications are being reviewed this week and that an announcement will be made very soon. She also noted that the special amendment to the Consolidated Plan for ESG-CV and CDBG-CV has been approved by HUD and the funds will be made available in the coming weeks. She noted that final allocation decisions still need to be made but most likely for programs that already render the service, the funding will go directly to them so as to get the support out asap. For services that are not currently being rendered a Request for Proposals will go out. Marie asked if the Outreach allocation would have to be just for one person or could it be rendered in a different manner. Dina noted that since we do not currently have outreach services that an RFP would go out and applicants could depict in their proposal the programmatic details as they see fit as long as it meets all of the requirements outlined in the RFP.

Beaver County Annual Veteran Stand Down

Tom Kaminsky

Tom stated that due to social distancing requirements this year the Veteran Stand Down will take place in The Cornerstone's parking lot instead of the New Brighton American Legion. He acknowledged the NB Legion's generosity with sharing their space last year. He stated that this may be a good way to introduce the TCBC location to veterans and vendors. He stated that the date is to be determined as they would like to push it a bit later into the fall to help avoid spread of the virus and in the hopes that the weather may be more appropriate then for an outdoor event. Addressing Racial Disparities

Dina Ciabattoni

Dina informed the group as funding is coming into the county that HUD is pushing for communities to ensure that these funds are used in equitable ways. She stated our CoC has a Racial Disparities committee and through its work we have discovered that we have disparate outcomes in our housing programs based on race. She mentioned less positive housing outcomes and longer lengths of time homeless based on race. She stated that the county is committed to making sure the new funds reach those who need it the most and are distributed in an equitable way. She stated that the Racial Disparities committee will reconvene soon, and she encouraged new membership. She stated if anyone has interest in joining the committee to contact her. She mentioned a HUD Webinar that will review various strategies for ensure equity across races and encouraged folks to tune if they could. She referenced the current national dialogue around racial justice and stated that with so much



new funding available in the county we could be part of the solution by introducing practices that reduce the disparate outcomes we have historically seen. If you are interested in being part of this work, contact Dina at ciabattonidina@gmail.com

Face Masks and PPE needs

Dina Ciabattoni

Dina reported that the Community Development Program received a large donation of face masks from the Hanes company. If agencies need them for their staff and clients please contact Cassie at CDP (724. 770.2040) and let her know how many you need. Dina stressed that the donation is plentiful, so she encouraged folks to ask for what they need. She also noted that there is additional funding for other PPE such as gloves, hand sanitizer, thermometers, cleaning supplies etc. If you have these types of needs please let Dina know so we can order the supplies.

Bed Availability Dina Ciabattoni

Dina noted a slight uptick on the CE wait lists. She reported that the programs have been doing a great job of getting folks enrolled from the lists but that many of the programs are now at capacity. She stated that can change from moment to moment though. She also mentioned that the HA has vouchers specifically for moving people who are ready out of PSH and into their own units. She expects that this will help with opening up some PSH beds. She also noted that there is an opening in the 811 program which is for people aged 18-61 who are living with a disability and are at risk of institutionalization. She noted the unit is in Koppel so it is not a great fit for people who are dependent on public transportation. She thanked the group for reviewing this chart every month.



Pandemic Unemployment Assistance

The Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security (CARES) Act creates a new temporary federal program called Pandemic Unemployment Assistance (PUA).

In general, PUA provides up to 39 weeks of unemployment benefits to individuals not eligible for regular unemployment compensation or extended benefits, including those who have exhausted all rights to such benefits.

Individuals covered under PUA include the self-employed (e.g. independent contractors, gig economy workers, and workers for certain religious entities), those seeking part-time employment, individuals lacking sufficient work history, and those who otherwise do not qualify for regular unemployment compensation or extended benefits.

PUA is a Federal Program. All PUA questions must be obtained through the PUA office not the Unemployment office.

- Income at or below 30% AMI
- Eligible for the Housing Authority
