

May 13, 2021 Meeting Agenda

Welcome and Housekeeping: Dina called the meeting to order at 1:34 pm. She asked everyone to sign into the chat and reminded them that the meeting is being recorded to assist with the minutes. It will not be shared.

Since the Housing & Homeless Coalition welcomes ideas, opinions, and knowledge from a broad spectrum of partners, meetings are open to the public and new members are always welcomed. Meetings take place the 2nd Thursday of every month at 1:30 pm on Zoom until further notice. The meetings are recorded to help prepare the meeting minutes but will not be shared or posted.

1. OPEN DISCUSSION

Dina Ciabattoni (CoC Coordinator) had several announcements. First she shared the sad news that Lynell Scaff unexpectedly passed away. Dina stated that Lynell had been a regular participant at this meeting as the Director of BCCAN and she also touched so many of our organizations through the many trainings they offer. Dina asked for a moment of silence to remember her and her family.

Dina also reported the Unemployment Compensation system is being updated. There is a webinar on these changes on May 17, at 1:00 pm. **UPDATE:** More information on the new system can be found here: https://www.uc.pa.gov/unemployment-benefits/UCBenMod/Pages/Quick-Tips.aspx

Dina also shared the Participant Satisfaction Survey. She asked partners to provide the survey (using the online link found below or the paper form that Dina emailed) to clients who have exited from CoC residential programs. The survey is a result of the work of the Racial Disparities committee, and they are seeking to learn about clients' personal experiences — what worked and what didn't work well. She noted that there is also an option if survey participants would like to further discuss their experiences in focus groups. See attached survey.

Finally, she shared that there are Personal Protective Equipment and cleaning supplies at the Community Development Program. She encouraged agencies to stock up so we don't get caught off guard like we did at the beginning of the pandemic. Contact Cassie 724.770.2040 to arrange pick up.

Amy Frank (Harmony House/Lighthouse) shared that Lighthouse currently has 3 openings. She reminded the group that eligible clients must have CYS involvement and some recovery time. For more information, call 724.728.3350.

Josh Fisher (Veteran Leadership Program) introduced himself as the Outreach worker for VLP which is a new position for the agency. He noted that he can help connect veterans to RRH, TH, assist with disability applications etc. He is available to assist veterans as needed. He can be reached at:

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fisherj@vlpwpa.org Cyndi Gilkey asked for him to connect with her as Neighborhood Legal Services has resources available for veterans as well. Dina noted that the most recent VA CHALENG survey revealed one of the greatest needs for both male and female veterans is legal services so she thanked NLS for targeting their services to veterans. Nancy Grieco asked him if he works for the Cornerstone and he stated that he does not. She then asked who at The Cornerstone works with veterans. Marie answered that is Chris Anderson (canderson@cornerstonebeaver.org) and Bryan Shannon (bshannon@CornerstoneBeaver.org). Marie noted that VLP is a good organization and she welcomed Josh. Nancy stated that she would pass along the contact information for Josh, Chris, and Bryan to her colleagues at the Red Cross.

Nancy Grieco (American Red Cross) reported 2 house fires since the last meeting affecting 3 adults.

David Simmons (ABC Associates) reports that they have resumed administering Vivitrol inside of their facility. He also reported that their D&A counselors are operating under a hybrid model. They will meet with people face to face if the person passes a screening protocol.

Cynthia Gilkey (Neighborhood Legal Services) reported that their offices remain closed, but they are rendering services over the phone. She said they are able to meet face to face as needed.

Heather Slaughter (Self Determination Housing Project) reported that they have a number of upcoming webinars including but not limited to landlord engagement, equity inclusion, etc. She will email the information to Dina. **UPDATE:** Dina forwarded the email to Coalition members.

2. AGENDA

Eviction Moratorium update

Cynthia Gilkey (Neighborhood Legal Services)

Cyndi reported that the current state of the CDC's Eviction Moratorium is a bit confusing. She stated the Federal District in Washington D.C. ruled that the Eviction Moratorium (EM) was unconstitutional. She reminded the group that the EM only protects people from being evicted for non-payment of rent and the household must complete a declaration in order to be covered by the EM. The Fed. District court ruling is being questioned as to whether it applies to local counties. She stressed that Neighborhood Legal Services plans to argue if the Federal District's determination is upheld that it doesn't apply at the local level. She went on to report that the Justice Department appealed the decision, and the stay (a temporary halt to the decision) was granted – meaning the EM is currently still in place until June 30th. However, because the stay is temporary the EM could still be ruled unconstitutional prior to the June 30th deadline. Cyndi has agreed to keep this group updated as the EM status is challenged. Dina asked Cyndi that if it is determined to be constitutional does she have any sense of whether the EM will be extended. Cyndi responded that her opinion is that it will not be extended. She reminded that group that Neighborhood Legal Services can assist in eviction proceedings. Since the EM is currently still in place, Dina will re-send the declaration forms to this group as folks are not protected if they do not have a completed declaration form.

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Vaccine Clinics Dina Ciabattoni

Dina shared that the vaccine clinics being offered in partnership with Central Outreach Wellness are well underway. The Cornerstone and Women's Center both sponsored clinics. The second shot clinic will be held at The Cornerstone on May 24th from 12:30 -3:30pm. Folks are also welcomed to come receive a first shot at this clinic too. And the Salvation Army will be hosting a first shot clinic on this Sunday May 16th from 2:30-3:30 during their meal distribution. See attached flyer. She stressed that folks do not need an appointment, nor do they need proof of insurance. She also clarified that the vaccine is Pfizer so children 12 and older are welcomed at the clinic. Parental permission is required. Central Outreach will be returning to the sites to administer the 2nd doses. She thanked the three host agencies for making their spaces available and extending the reach of the clinic. She also thanked Central Outreach Wellness for their critical piece in generously sharing and administering their vaccine supply to our clients. She also thanked Branden Dudek for making this important connection!

Emergency Rental Assistance Program

Dina Ciabattoni

Dina reported that the ERAP program is rolling out. There were a few obstacles initially that needed worked out, but the program is now picking up pace. She reminded the group that households and landlords can apply. Applications are available on COMPASS at:

The application can be printed from the CDP website and Dina stated that she can deliver to agencies printed forms as well. She reminded the group that submitting the application is only the first part – the household will have to submit additional documents to demonstrate eligibility. Cyndi stated that some clients think the Landlord must sign the application. Dina clarified that is not the case. The case workers will work with landlords to obtain necessary information if the tenant cannot get it from the landlord initially. Dina also mentioned for utility arrears a report of the missed payments from the utility company is required. This is to show that the missed payments occurred during the eligibility period. She asked the group to help their clients navigate this hurdle as utility payments are being delayed when this document is missing. She noted overall that missing documents (proof of income, copies of lease, bills etc) are the biggest cause of delayed payments. Although the program is working on how to streamline this any help that our partners can lend is also greatly appreciated. She reminded the group that Beaver County has been allotted \$10 million and that it will require all of us pulling together to get this much needed assistance out to households and landlords.

Outreach Dina Ciabattoni

Dina referenced the Coordinated Entry numbers on the Bed Availability chart and discussed that the numbers have been coming down over the last few months. She reflected that it is likely because people are not getting evicted but that it doesn't mean homelessness has magically ended. Because we suspect there are still folks who are unsheltered and we historically expect an uptick in unsheltered

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people as temperatures warm up, we are going to conduct an outreach event. This will be the first such event in over a year due to the pandemic. She stressed that we will still have to be very careful conducting outreach now — masks, social distancing, hand washing etc. She explained that we will organize teams to cover certain areas in the county as we have done in the past. She asked for people who have done outreach before either in Beaver County or elsewhere to please consider volunteering and to place their information in the chat. She is hoping to conduct the event on May 21st if possible.

Bed Availability Dina Ciabattoni

Dina pointed out that many programs currently have openings. This is problematic because we know there are folks who could benefit from the programs and the openings leave the programs underspent on their grants. She is hopeful that funders will be understanding of this as limited unit turnover has had an impact on the number of people presenting for services.







A subsidized housing program for disabled adults (age 18-61) who are either in an institution or at risk of institutionalization and who are able to reside in the community with supports. Criteria include:

- Disabled and Medicaid eligible. Also eligible for long-term services and supports
- Income at or below 30% AMI
- Eligible for the Housing Authority
