

June 9, 2022 Meeting Agenda

Welcome and Housekeeping: Dina called the meeting to order around 1:34 pm. She reminded everyone to sign into the chat and stated that the meeting is being recorded to assist with the preparation of the minutes and will not be shared or posted.

1. OPEN DISCUSSION

Herta Madder (BCBH) reported on MultiSystemic Therapy's new youth mobile program. It is an intensive in-home program for youth who have had several psychiatric hospitalizations. She reported that they use a team approach with 2 therapists, and they address the needs of the whole family. The program will be ready to accept referrals on 6/10. An Intensive Behavior Health Service referral is needed and can be found at this link along with more program infomation:

Kierstyn Marcucci (Fair Housing Law Center) shared that June is Pride Awareness Month. She reminded the group that gender, sex, and sexual orientation are protected classes. This is new for some landlords so she suggested keeping an eye out for this type of discrimination. Nancy Grieco (American Red Cross) reported no new events since our last meeting. She did note that there are still 2 cases open from previous events but they do not want assistance at this time.

Dina Ciabattoni (CoC Coordinator) shared a flyer from the Beaver County Association for the Blind regarding their Vision Clinic taking place on 7/20/22 at 616 Fourth Street Beaver Falls, PA (near the Fruit Market). 2. AGENDA

HOME-ARP feedback/input

Marlene Landrum

Marlene reported that we have received 43 survey responses already and thanked everyone for their input. She noted that some of the responses to the regular HOME RFP could possibly be funded under HOME-ARP. She indicated that several of those proposals were for low income housing with a few targeting seniors. Marlene stated that she will use some housing studies to determine if this population is in need of this type of housing. She welcomed further comments and ideas from folks because she The mission of the Housing and Homeless Coalition of Beaver County is to provide support, direction, and

collaboration in effectively addressing the issues of homelessness and affordable, sustainable housing in Beaver County by identifying and utilizing all available resources.



stated that she wants to make sure the funding is used to address real needs in the County. A question was asked if seniors are an eligible population. Dina clarified that the eligible populations (in brief summary) include: HUD homeless, HUD at-risk of homelessness, DV, and an at-risk category that includes people who are extremely low income and at specific risk for returning to homelessness. She clarified that seniors, veterans, etc could fall into any of these eligible categories. Dina again stressed that this is a unique opportunity to enhance affordable housing for people who are homeless. Marlene stated that there will be public hearings to gather more input, and that the County will be hiring a consultant to help coordinate this research, develop and submit the plan to HUD, and to oversee the development of the program. Dina noted that it is not too late to submit ideas.

Homeless Prevention programs overview

Chris Anderson (ESG & SSVF)

Dina reminded the group that there are programs to assist people who do not meet the definition of HUD homeless. She invited those programs here today to give an overview of those programs. Chris Anderson from The Cornerstone discussed the ESG Homeless Prevention program. Chris stated that the household must have a magistrate eviction notice (even if they have not gone to court yet). She stated that the notice is good for 30 days, so it is important to get it turned in asap. Also, if a person or family member has paid for hotel, they can submit the receipt with the client's name on it as proof of their eligibility for this program. Once determined eligible, clients will need to present the following documents: Photo ID for head of household, social security cards for all members of the household, and proof of income from last 30 days. Chris stated that in Pay to Stay situations, they can pay up to 6 months (depending on the amount owed and the current fund balance). Fair Market Rent does not apply in Pay to Stay. If the household must move, then the program can pay 1st month rent and security deposit if it is a private landlord. If the property is subsidized, the program can only pay the security deposit. Fair Market Rent does apply if the person is moving into a new place. Chris then provided an overview of the Supportive Services for Veteran Families Homeless Prevention Program. She noted that the main difference is that the SSVF program can assist folks who have an eviction notice from the landlord only. Chris stated that the landlord notice must have specific details and TCBC can work with the landlords on this. This program cannot assist those with a hotel receipt like ESG can. She also reported that the person must be veteran eligible. This is established with the DD214 and through a Squares report. A full name, date of birth, and Social Security Number are needed to run that report. Again, if the unit is subsidized they can only pay the security deposit. If the property is privately owned, then they can provide on-going support for a longer period of time. They can also provide a shallow subsidy which is 50% of rent for up to 24 months. Chris clarified that these programs can be reached by calling The Cornerstone at 724.846.6400.

Marlene Landrum (ERAP)

Marlene reported that the ERAP 1 allocation is nearly fully spent and/or obligated. There is about \$7 million in ERAP 2. She stated that ERAP 2 still must be Covid related. It can pay for 12 months of

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arrears in utilities for a total of 18 months. She clarified that the FC handles intake and documenting eligibility. CDP does a second review, prepares, and submits the check request. The Controller then cuts and mails the checks. Marlene discussed the efforts to streamline some of the delays – including a revised Landlord Form (see attached) and the hiring of an additional person to address the backlog. ERAP questions can be directed to the Franklin Center at 724.378.2882. Marlene stated that ERAP can pay magistrate fees. She also reported that despite Allegheny County closing their program, ours is still open until Sept. 2024 or when the funding runs out.

Dina Ciabattoni (HAP)

Dina presented on the Franklin Center's other Homeless Prevention program – Homeless Assistance Program (HAP). She stated that the definition of homeless used for HAP is broader and the household does not need to have an eviction notice. Bed Availability Dina Ciabattoni

Dina reviewed the Housing Inventory chart. She noted that the Coordinated Entry numbers increased by 8 since our last meeting. The PSH and TH waitlists remained about the same and the RRH waitlist had an increase. The Housing Authority reports very short waitlists at the Beaver Falls locations. Also, there are six, 2-bedrooms units available at Valley View. Harmony House and Lighthouse also have vacancies.

- Disabled and Medicaid eligible. Also eligible for long-term services and supports
 - Income at or below 30% AMI
- Eligible for the Housing Authority
