

July 14, 2022 Meeting Agenda

Welcome and Housekeeping: Dina called the meeting to order around 1:35 pm. She reminded the folks on Zoom to sign into the chat and the people in the room to sign the sign-in sheet. The Housing & Homeless Coalition welcomes ideas, opinions, and knowledge from a broad spectrum of partners; thus meetings are open to the public and new members are always welcomed. Meetings take place the 2nd Thursday of every month at 1:30 pm. Meetings will be provided in the safest format. 1. OPEN DISCUSSION

Darcy Casey (Housing Authority) reported that the HA will be adding a cover sheet to the applications for case manager information. This will enable the HA to contact the case manager should they have difficulty reaching the applicant.

Heather Slaughter (SDHP/Inglis) reported that SDHP received \$125 million for their Home Modification Program. She explained that SDHP does not work directly with clients – rather they work on the system level. She is available to provide technical assistance and education. Heather noted that she is available to come to your sites to do training. She also reminded the group of the webinar series she recently sent out. She spoke of their landlord outreach team and noted that training on risk mitigation funds will be coming soon. Heather also reported two 811 units available at Koppel Terrace. These are units for people with a disability, who are Medicaid eligible, and who are at risk of institutionalization. She noted that the bus does not access this location. Finally, she reported that SDHP is hiring for two positions in the eastern part of the state and that a regional coordinator position will be opening soon in the western part of the state.

Nancy Grieco (Red Cross) reported 5 family fires since our last meeting. She indicated that 10 adults and 1 minor were impacted. There are currently 3 open cases, but the households are still determining if they need/want help. She also noted that the Red Cross is currently retraining all of their volunteers.

Dina Ciabattoni (Continuum of Care Coordinator) reported the following:

- The Literacy Pittsburgh calendars in the emailed packet. She stated that the agency will be coming next month to present on their services.
- The two survey links on the agenda. One is to gauge veteran needs so the VA can plan their services accordingly. And the other is for BCBH to determine unmet needs and plan accordingly.

2. AGENDA

Crossroads Treatment Centers

Jessica Rogan

Jessica introduced herself as the Care Manager at Crossroads Treatment Center in Beaver. She stated that although new to Beaver County, they have been in Greenville since 2005 and they have 120

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locations in 10 states throughout the nation. She stated that their phone is answered 24 hours a day and they can do an instant intake. She noted that they can dispense medication prior to the first appointment as part of their harm reduction strategies. She stated that patients are screened at every appointment, and they have a testing lab in the office for quick results. They screen for both drugs and medication levels which help determine the frequency of follow up appointments. They can also test for HepC and provide treatment as needed. She stated that they accept Medicaid and Medicare and are considered a Center of Excellency. She stated that they do refer to other services as needed as well (transportation, housing, food) and she is looking forward to getting know members of this group for that reason. She further described that Crossroads also provides mental health treatment. They can provide medication for depression, anxiety, and PTSD and medication is usually available the same day. They also can prescribe an app that focuses on Cognitive Behavioral Therapy techniques in 7 minutes sessions to help deter the urge to use. Counseling is also available. She invited everyone to their open house session on July 28th from 3 pm – 7pm at 1200 Sharon Road Beaver, PA. See attached flyer for more information.

ERAP highlights Marlene/Dina

Marlene wanted to cover the ERAP highlights today but was unable to attend the meeting. Dina shared her notes with the group. \$8.9 million has been spent from ERAP 1. This has assisted 1,794 unique households and 602 landlords. \$94,000 has been spent from ERAP 2. Marlene reported that 61% of households served were at or below 30% Area Median Income, 24% of households were between 31-50% AMI, and 15% were between 51-80% AMI. So the program truly is serving those at the lowest incomes. The program is slated to run to the end of September 2024 or until all funding is expended – whichever occurs first. She also noted that the backlog is being addressed with additional staff and new procedures (see attached landlord form).

Funding Opportunities Updates

Dina Ciabattoni

Dina provided updates on the two upcoming, anticipated funding opportunities. First, she reported that the Home4Good competition will be handled locally. She stated that typically, PHFA has the CoC coordinate the local competition and submit proposals to PHFA for final selection. This year they will be passing the funds directly to the CoC to disburse according to their needs. Dina stated that PHFA has not released the specific details yet but she will notify the group once they do. She anticipates that Community Development Program (CDP) will put out an RFP for these funds. Second, the CoC Competition has not officially opened yet. Based on the timing of pre-competition tasks, Dina thinks this will open around the beginning of August. She stated that CDP will put out RFPs for any new funding opportunities as soon as possible once the Notice of Funding Opportunity is released.

Bed Availability

Dina Ciabattoni

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Dina shared the bed Availability chart. She noted there are openings with Crescent Commons (must be chronically homeless and have an advocate) and Stone Harbour. Both of these programs accept referrals through Coordinated Entry. Dina also noted that there were no significant changes on the CE waitlists. See attached.


